IMPOSITION OF ASHES

The wearing of ash in both the Old and New Testament was a sign of repentance. Since Lent is a season of repentance we begin these special worship services with Ash Wednesday. If desired, worshipers may approach the altar to receive the imposition of ashes upon the forehead or on the palm of the hand. You are encouraged to approach the altar down the center aisle, and return down the side aisles. [The pastor shall speak the words, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return." (Genesis 3:19) The worship will continue when all have returned to their places.]

¹Now the serpent was more crafty than any other beast of the field that the LORD God had made.
