



"The Joy That Was Set Before Him Endured the Cross"

We read In Hebrews 12:1-3, 1"Let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, 2looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God. 3Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted."

Actor Dean Jones has starred in such films as 'The Love Bug', 'That Darn Cat' and 'Under the Yum Yum Tree'. After he became a follower of Christ in 1974, he began to sense that it became harder to get work. An executive who was friendly toward Jones told him that if he continued on his "born again trip," he would lose all value to the studio. He discovered that his refusal to make pictures which included gross violence, offensive language, salacious

material and other immoral activity limited his job offers. Because he had made some 25 successful pictures, ten of which were Disney films slanted toward family viewing, he already had enough personal resources to weather the rejection.

Yet Dean Jones wanted to take a stand against religious persecution wherever I might be found. As a result, he founded the Christian Rescue Committee which is geared to intercede on behalf of Christians, Jews, and others who are persecuted anywhere for their faith. "The biases I had to deal with in Hollywood because of my faith were what sensitized me to the religious persecution that goes on in the world," Jones said.

The actor has been able to perform in the stage revival of 'Showboat' as Cap'n Andy. He also has developed a one-man show about the author of the book of Revelation called St. John in Exile. Jones believes that his work with the Christian Rescue Committee enables him to help other people who have suffered for their beliefs. Yet, for a Hollywood star, it is a road less traveled because less than two percent of the creative Hollywood community attend religious services regularly.

Martin Luther's life was threatened due to his protesting of certain activities he felt did not befit the Church. He went into hiding and found refuge as the guest of the ruler of Saxony in Wartburg Castle. How was Luther to pass the time until it was safe for him to begin preaching and teaching openly again? He translated the Bible from the original languages German. It was not an easy task. There were various versions of the German language spoken across that country. The different dialects made it difficult for those from any given section of the country to



communicate easily with those from another.

Luther's Bible, therefore, was a great gift to the German people. The words he used — which, by the way, he checked with the castle's butcher to make sure the common person could understand — actually enabled the German people to have a unified language. In a real sense, Martin Luther was the father of the German language used today.

Luther was like others - look past the present reality - and held tightly to the Reality that was to come. Because of Jesus Christ suffering and death on the cross, we too look forward to that Joy that is to come. It is a joy that will not fade.

May God grant You Strength to fix your eyes on Jesus Christ and the joy that is to come.

God's Instruments, God's Stewards

For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them. (Eph. 2:10)

Some pastors refer to these words as "the most forgotten words in the Scriptures." They are forgotten because they follow the familiar and critical words before it. The preceding two verses that overshadow Ephesians 2:10 are words of justification: "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast" (Eph. 2:8–9). These are words preached regularly. They are assigned as confirmation verses. They carry with them the very heart of what it means to be a redeemed child of God!

Precisely because the previous verses are so central to salvation, they often overpower our practice of stewardship! We have been saved by grace. This is certain and sure because of Jesus. Works play no role in

our salvation. No credit taking for us! Grace is freely given. Faith is miraculously created by the Spirit and joyously received. This truth is so wonderful and so encompassing that we often miss out on WHY we are redeemed.

The grace of God revealed in Jesus calls us to faith. But St. Paul doesn't stop with grace and faith. He continues to the logical conclusion. Just like the creation declares the handiwork of God, the redemption of sinners like you and me declares His greatest handiwork! Redeemed stewards are created to reflect the grace and mercy God showers on us to others.



As Lutherans, we understand that good works

flow from faith in Jesus Christ. They are the fruit of the tree of salvation into which we have been grafted by grace. Sanctification and stewardship are both on-going and active confessions of what the Lord has done in us. These works are not always spectacular. Many times, they are simply parents showing Jesus to their children. They are compassionate actions that live out the truth of the Gospel to co-workers and even complete strangers. While they can be grand endeavors, more likely they are simple, beautiful works which highlight what Jesus has done in us.

These works aren't random either. They have been planned by God. God planned to use you as a faithful steward as you walk the road that leads you through your daily life. There are no chance encounters or coincidences. They have been planned by the Lord of the universe for the benefit of His creation. Good works are what point to God's greatest work: Jesus!

He calls you and me to walk in this faith, which flows from this grace, which has been poured out on us in Jesus. But even this is not to our credit. We are simply called to be faithful stewards of God's grace so that we may share it with those who need is as much as we do. God's Spirit carries us along in this. We are just the steward — the instrument in His hand to accomplish His plan and glorify Him!

The trips this year have been a great success including Noah's Ark, caroling, etc., and Pastor is grateful for the support. A complete summary of activities is included in the meeting packet.

Election - A call for nominations from the floor was requested. Having none, ballots were distributed to members. Elder nominees: Joe Heisinger, Jeff Laabs, Lee Pfaff; Trustees nominees: Bob Duwe, Bruce Pfingsten; Stewardship/Evangelism nominees: Bonnie Grueneberg, Linda Heisinger; Board of Education nominee: Kim Young.

Treasurer/Financial - The budget for each board was reviewed. It was noted that the expense of \$3,780.28 is a shared expense, split 62%/38% between Faith and St. John's. A motion was made that the outreach mission funds that had been collected for Corey Rajek will now go to Vicar Paul Mroczenski who is currently located in Puerto Rico, now that Corey is back in the states. The motion was seconded and passed. The Labor of Love mission funds remain within the church. The final budget for 2025 is \$205,829.22. A motion to approve the 2025 budget was made, seconded and approved.

Audit - The audit report indicated everything is reconciled, all bills have been paid in a timely manner and records were well organized.

Old Business - Chris Stogbauer provided an update on the building addition. The original building estimate was \$105,000. The fill and excavating was donated along with some manual labor which offset the cost by \$15,000, bringing the cost down to 90,000. Additionally, donations from the congregation have brought the cost down to approximately \$43,000 to complete the building. The building is set to be delivered on February 3rd, 2025. Due to the weather, the crew is planning to begin constructing it within 2-3 weeks of delivery which sets completion of the outer shell around the end of February.

Deb Stogbauer is looking for volunteers to start going through church belongings so when the building is ready, we can begin efficiently using it for storage.

A motion was made, seconded and passed to use \$6,000 from the Scrip Program towards the completion costs of the building. It was also suggested to allocate the remaining balance from Investments, a motion was made, seconded and passed to move forward with this.

There was approximately \$3,000 raised at the 2024 Pancake Breakfast, a motion was made, seconded and passed to donate this money to the Klade Family. Pastor provided a brief update on the Klade family. It was discussed that potential recipients of this donation be mentioned at the 2025 semi-annual meeting and then finalized at least one month prior to the Pancake Breakfast.

- for Lutheran pastors worldwide, that they would have access to the necessary books and resources to teach Law and Gospel.
- 18. for the health and safety of LCMS missionaries who provide theological education, thanks that they have heeded the call to serve Christ in this way.
- for Lutheran church workers in Europe, that their work is fruitful.
- 20. for the seminaries of LCMS partner churches around the world, that they would faithfully educate future leaders for their churches.
- 21. for the Gospel multiplication as pastors are equipped to teach their flocks and train new leaders for the church, thank God for the growth of His Kingdom.
